Legal Framework: Jordan Maritime Authority Law No. (46) for the year 2006, and amendments thereto.

Priorities and targeted results within the determined ceilings for the years 2024 - 2026 :

First Priority:

 Jordan's maritime law has been promulgated to keep pace with international and regional developments and meet national needs.

Key procedures to realize the first priority:

- Following-up on the work of the committee set up to prepare a draft contemporary maritime law in line with developments and changes in modern maritime laws. The draft law is currently in the Legislation and Opinion Bureau pending the adoption of the remaining constitutional procedures.
- Updating the maritime regulations to keep abreast of the new law on the licensing and certification of maritime education and training companies/institutions, the instructions of the examination body and centre for maritime education and training standards, the instructions for the application of the annexes to the 1973 International Convention for the Prevention of Pollution from Ships and its amendments and the instructions for the application of the provisions of the International Convention on Training Levels the issuance of certificates and shifts to naval personnel in the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan.
- Participation of stakeholders in maritime law conferences and training courses to follow up on new legal developments and information.

First Priority Outcomes:

- _ Modern maritime law
- _ Technical maritime instructions keeping pace with the new law

First priority-related program:

Administration and Support Services.

Second Priority:

_ Automation of services provided by the Jordanian Maritime Commission

Key procedures to realize the second priority:

- _ Identifying requirements and requirements to improve automated services to implement the elnvoices application to facilitate the collection of fees and payments securely until the processing of the digital transformation project.
- Follow-up on the implementation of the Digital Transformation Plan in coordination with the Ministry of Digital Economy to initiate implementation of the automation project and inventory the main services provided by the Authority to determine the flow of data to implement the progress of each service and remove unnecessary operations when implementing the service and then adopt the procedures of services and models to be converted.
- Issuing reports for periodic data statistics from the electronic systems programmed by the Authority. The digital transformation software will subsequently be linked to the PowerPI data management software.

Second Priority Outcomes:

- Realize connectivity in the financial payment of services
- _ Automated and computerized services
- _ Re-engineering procedures and processes
- _ Developed software of databases for the purposes of statistics

Second priority-related program:

■ Maritime Transport

Priority of gender, youth and persons with disabilities :

- Qualifying, developing and training the staff working in the Authority through training programs and raising the level of scientific qualification equally.
- Provide a building for the Jordanian Maritime Authority that is eligible to receive service recipients from persons with disabilities.

Key procedures to realize the priority of gender, youth and persons with disabilities :

- Organizing awareness-raising and training programs for male and female employees on the importance of diversity and equality and how to deal with the needs of young people and persons with disabilities.
- Comprehensively evaluate the upgrading and maintenance of all of the Authority's facilities to avoid impediments to the movement of service recipients with disabilities.

The following outcomes are expected to be realized for the priority of gender, youth and persons with disabilities:

- Increasing the number of staff to be qualified commensurate with the specificity and nature of the Commission's work.
- The Jordanian Maritime Authority building is eligible to receive service recipients from persons with disabilities.

Priority of climate change:

- Control and inspection of foreign vessels that secure the port of Aqaba by adhering to special international requirements and international conventions such as the Marbol Convention, the Biofouling Code and the sulfur commitment to ships' fuel.
- Monitoring and inspection of Jordanian-flagged national vessels by adhering to special international requirements and international conventions such as the Marbol Convention, the Biofouling Code and the sulfur commitment to ships' fuel.
- Opportunities for economic growth and job creation through climate change response actions.
- Effective implementation of international conventions for the prevention of pollution from ships, adoption of air pollution and energy efficiency restrictions and increased port efficiency through optimal operation of facilities.

Key procedures to realize climate change-related priority:

- Control of ships' greenhouse gas emissions and management of biofouling and ship-generated waste in line with international agreements and work with competent authorities at the national level to provide low carbon ship fuel.
- Complying with maritime regulations and laws to ensure the safety of Jordanian shipping and vessels to ensure that they comply with international safety and quality standards.
- Ensuring that foreign vessels securing the port of Aqaba apply the requirements of Annex VI of the MARPOL Agreement through the Authority's Port Control Department.

The following outcomes are expected to be realized for the priority of climate change:

- _ All foreign vessels securing the port of Aqaba are committed to special international requirements and international conventions such as the Marbol Convention and the Biofouling Code and are bound by the sulphur content of the fuel used therein.
- All Jordanian-flagged national vessels are committed to special international requirements and international conventions such as the Marbol Convention and the Biofouling Code and are bound by the sulphur content of the fuel used therein.

Program of climate change-related priority:

■ Maritime Transport

Tasks of the Ministry / Department:

- _ Grant work practicing licenses in all sector's activities in coordination and cooperation with competent authorities taking into account the provisions of Aqaba Special Economic Zone applicable law
- Issuing official documents for employees in the sector, including eligibility certificates and no-objection permits for ships to leave territorial waters after confirmation that there is no technical or judicial seizure.
- Conducting surveillance and inspection activities within the port of Aqaba and within Jordan's territorial waters in accordance with national legislation and relevant international conventions
- Monitoring maritime, coastal navigation and monitoring of maritime search and rescue activities within and outside Jordanian territorial waters.
- Investigate maritime disasters and accidents within the Jordanian regional water and on the Jordanian ships wherever they existed
- Recommending bilateral, regional and international maritime agreements and following up their implementation.
- Cooperation and coordination with local, regional and international authorities related to the Authority work and the Kingdom's representation in the commissions, organizations, councils, federations and regional and international maritime committees and following up their activities.
- Preparing studies, collecting data and information related to the sector and classifying and analyzing them, and issuing periodical reports and bulletins about the sector activities.
- _ Exercising the powers of Aqaba Port Department stipulated in the applicable maritime trade law
- Taking the necessary actions to ensure that ships meet the requirements of maritime security, health security, protection of the marine environment, maritime telecommunications of the Global Maritime Distress and Safety Network and confront the effects of maritime disasters that include shores& ships, and organize, document, control and seize contravening vessels, taking into account the provisions of the Aqaba Special Economic Zone Law.
- Regulating entry of ships into territorial waters, searching for fallen objects at sea and collecting fees, charges and allowances under a Bylaw issued to this end.
- Registering ships under the Jordanian flag.

Ministry/Department Contribution to the Achievement of the National Objectives :

_ Improving the level of services provided for citizens and justice in distribution.

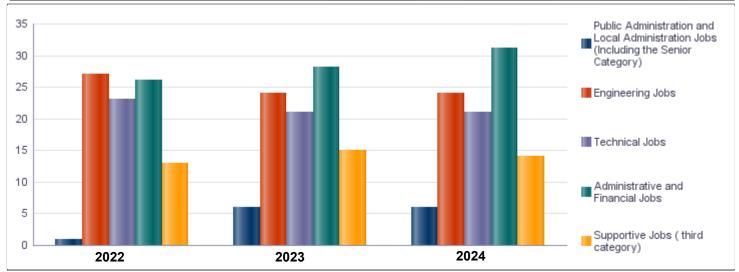
Major Issues and Challenges which face the Ministry / Department:

- The adoption of the draft Jordanian maritime law, which is considered to be one of the most important projects operated by the Jordanian Maritime Authority was stumbled. The Jordanian Maritime Trade Law of 1972 was revised. It is a law that does not meet new developments in the international maritime sector. A committee was established under the Prime Minister's decision in letter No. P2330/7 of 2021/2/21. In order to examine the position of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan regarding the adoption of the Rotterdam Rules within the provisions of the Jordanian Maritime Code or the maintenance of the Hamburg Rules, maritime law remains stuck in the corridors of the Department of Legislation and Opinion.
- _ A distortion in the financial and administrative independence of the Jordanian Maritime Authority.
- Leakage of competencies due to the gap between the salaries of Jordanian Maritime Authority employees and those of other neighbouring countries.

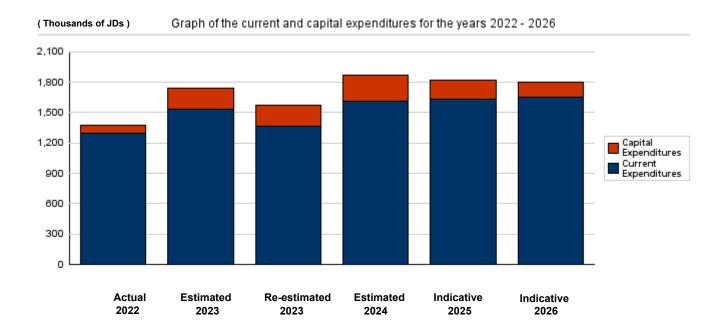
Most notable differences between estimated appropriations for 2024 and re-estimated for 2023

Current expenditure:

- Compensations of employees group increased by approximately (235) thousand JDs over re-estimation for 2023, this is due to the natural increase in staff salaries and the allocation of funds to mobilize the cost of vacant posts remaining from prior years and updated on the 2024 manpower tables.
- Use of goods and Services group (operational expenditure) appropriations increased by approximately (10) thousand JDs over the re-estimation for 2023 and the increase represents the natural increase in this group.

Capital expenditure :

Capital expenditures increased by (50) thousand JDs over the 2023 re-estimation. The most notable changes were the Authority's budget for 2024 to make the necessary financial allocations for construction item and cases and compansations fees item, pursuant to the decision of the Court of Cassation No. 6534/2022 of the date of the 7/3/2023, in which it gained a conclusive degree, taking into account the regulation and rationalization of the allocation of other items within the Authority's capital projects.
